### WATAUGA COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 2017

The Watauga County Board of Commissioners held a regular meeting, as scheduled, on Tuesday, February 6, 2018, at 8:30 A.M. in the Commissioners' Board Room of the Watauga County Administration Building, Boone, North Carolina.

Chairman Welch called the meeting to order at 8:30 A.M.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION'S RECOMMENDATION ON APPALACHIAN THEATRE'S REQUEST FOR FUNDS

Mr. Joe Furman, Planning and Inspections Director, presented a recommendation from the Economic Development Commission (EDC) that the Board of Commissioners provide a one-time allocation in the amount of \$25,000 to Appalachian Theatre. This is in response to the Theatre's previous request for \$100,000 annually for a ten (10) year period. The County has allocated \$10,000 for the past three (3) years.

Mr. Furman stated that in the time since the request was originally made, the Theatre's project has been scaled back. The EDC had requested a new proposal from the Theatre; however, one has not been presented. It is an eligible EDC project.

County Manager Geouque stated that should the Board wish to grant the request, two funding options were available. The first option would be to fund the request from the EDC Capital Reserve Account. The second option would be to fund the request from County's fund balance. Staff's recommendation would be for the allocation to come from the EDC Capital Reserve Account as this would be an appropriate expense and the purpose for which the account was established.

Vice-Chairman Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Turnbow, moved to award a one-time contribution to the Appalachian Theatre, in the amount of \$25,000, to be allocated from Economic Development Commission Capital Reserve Account.

### MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

A. Resolution Ordering The Referendum For A Quarter-Cent Local Option Sales Tax With The Proceeds To Be Utilized For A 2 Cent Property Tax Rate Reduction In Watauga County

County Manager Geouque stated that, at the Annual Budget Retreat, the Board discussed conducting a special referendum for a one-quarter percent local option sales tax. In the event that the one-quarter percent local option sales tax is successful the proceeds would be used to reduce the current property tax rate of \$0.353 by two (2) cents for a new rate of \$0.333. A proposed resolution was presented requesting the Board of Elections conduct a special referendum for the one-quarter percent local option sales tax by placing it on the ballot for May 17, 2018.

Chairman Welch read the wording as it would appear on the ballot:

#### "[] FOR [] AGAINST

Local sales and use tax at the rate of one-quarter percent (0.25%) in addition to all other State and local sales and use taxes."

County Manager Geouque stated that NC General Statutes govern the exact wording for the ballot and stated that the proposed use of income generated could not be included.

If the voters pass the referendum and the Board of Commissioners wishes to levy the tax, it must provide 10 days public notice of its intent to adopt a resolution to levy the tax. After it adopts the resolution, it must send a certified copy of the resolution along with a certified copy of the election results of the referendum to the Department of Revenue.

The earliest the sales tax may become effective is on the first day of any calendar quarter so long as the County gives the Secretary of Revenue at least 90 days' advance notice. For example, if a

referendum is held in May during the general election and passes, the earliest a county could begin collecting the revenue would be October.

After discussion, Commissioner Yates, seconded by Commissioner Hodges, moved to adopt the resolution as presented.

The County Manager presented a draft agenda for review. The agenda is still in draft form and may change between now and the retreat based on input from the Board or the County Manager receiving additional items for consideration.

#### C. Boards and Commissions

County Manager Geouque presented the following nominations:

#### <u>AppalCART</u>

The Town of Boone recommends the appointment of Ms. Connie Ulmer and Mr. Marshall Ashcraft as Town representatives on AppalCART's Board. County Manager Geouque stated that the AppalCART Board does not have alternates and, therefore, he would ask the Town to send one nomination.

#### Watauga County Board of Adjustment

The terms of Bill Ragan, Baxter Palmer and Todd Rice expired in November. All three are willing to continue to serve if reappointed. NC Statutes require a representative (resident) of each zoned area in counties that have partial-county zoning such as Watauga. Mr. Rice represents the Valle Crucis Historic District, which is a small area with limited population, therefore small pool of potential representatives. Mr. Palmer is the alternate member and is the representative of the Foscoe-Grandfather zoned area. Mr. Ragan resides in the Howard Creek Watershed, which is not a zoned area in the traditional sense, but since the watershed ordinance was adopted under zoning authority, the County has attempted to appoint residents of those areas when possible.

The Pond Creek (Beech Mountain) Watershed Ordinance was not adopted under zoning authority as it is not large enough to qualify for partial-county zoning. Adam Rhyne resides in the South Fork New River/Winkler Creek/Middle Fork watershed (the boundaries adjoin and form one larger watershed-regulated area). David Hill and Charles Phillips are at-large members. Those 3 terms are not expiring this year. The new South Fork New River Watershed for the new Boone water intake does not have a representative.

Volunteer applications have been received from Mr. John Prickett, Mr. Joe Quinn, and Mr. Michael Moore. All three have requested to serve on the Board of Adjustment. These are first readings.

County Manager Geouque stated that upon review, Mr. Moore's application indicates he lives in the Foscoe-Grandfather Community. He does not live within the zoned area or the community council designated area.

#### Economic Development Commission

Mr. Robert Hoffman recently resigned from the Economic Development Commission (EDC) due to relocation. His term expires in June 2020. A volunteer application has been received from Mr. Wallace Greer who has requested to serve on the EDC. If appointed, he would fill the unexpired term which ends on June 30, 2020.

Vice-Chairman Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Yates, moved to appoint Mr. Wallace Greer to fill an un-expired term on the Economic Development Commission (EDC) with his term to expire on June 30, 2020.

#### Watauga County Nursing Home Community Advisory Committee

Mr. Fred Badders' term expired January 20, 2018, on the Watauga County Nursing Home Community Advisory Committee. He is willing to continue to serve an additional three-year term if reappointed.

Vice-Chairman Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Yates, moved to reappoint Mr. Fred Badders to a three-year term on the Watauga County Nursing Home Community Advisory Committee.

#### Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee

Mr. Harold Eller's term will expire March 3, 2018, on the Watauga County Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee. He is willing to continue to serve an additional three-year term if reappointed. This is a first reading.

#### <u>Tourism Development Authority (TDA)</u>

The terms of Mr. Jim Neustadt and Mr. Brad Moretz will expire February 28, 2018. The two seats must be occupied by someone representing a business that collects the occupancy tax in Watauga County. Mr. Wright Tilley, Watauga County TDA Director, has stated that both are willing to continue to serve an additional three-year term if reappointed. This is a first reading.

#### WAMY Community Action

Ms. Joy Coffey's final term as a Public Sector representative for Watauga County ends on February 8, 2018. Ms. Melissa Soto, Executive Director of WAMY, requests a Commissioner or appointee be appointed to fill the four-year term. This is a first reading.

Commissioner Turnbow requested that the Boards and Commissions listed be advertised requesting volunteers to serve.

# PROPOSED HEALTH DEPARTMENT BUILDING RENOVATION CHANGE ORDER MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Mr. Robert Marsh will present Change Order number two regarding the health department renovations. The Board previously approved Change Order number one (1) which was the upgrade from standard carpet to carpet tiles. Change Order number two (2) includes the raising of two (2) electrical boxes and lowering data outlets to accommodate new base cabinets; installation of new ball valves/cutoffs for the water distribution lines for the upper level floor area; and the addition of three (3) circuit/outlets. Total cost of the Change Order is \$2,150.29. Funds are available in the current \$20,000 contingency to cover the expense. However, Randy Jones will reimburse the County \$1,423.29 for a net expense of \$727 to the County.

Board approval is requested to approve Change Order number two (2) in the amount of \$2,150.29 with the funds to come from the project contingency with Randy Jones to reimburse \$1,423.29.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In October 2017 VPC Builders was awarded a contract to renovate a large section of the top floor of the Health Department and a small section of the main level. The justification for this project was to relocate several departments in order to make the best use of this space. Currently, the Environmental Health technicians have been relocated to the offices where the Tax Appraisers worked until being relocated back into the Courthouse. Planning and Inspections, Veteran Services and Red Cross will be moving into the space formerly occupied by Environmental Health.

The contractor has made good progress and has received substantial completion within the time specified by the contract documents. During the course of construction, the County requested an upgrade of the carpet which led to the issuance of Change Order Number 1. In December, several electrical and plumbing items surfaced which required a quick response from the County so progress would not be delayed. County staff and the architect approved the additional work which included the addition of several dedicated electrical receptacles and a remote plumbing valve.

The architect has performed a pre-final inspection and issued substantial completion. The contractor has received a punch list, and move-in date will be established once the contractor and staff are satisfied that all punch list items have been corrected.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board approve Change Order Number Two in the amount of \$2,150.29. Randy Jones, Project Architect, has agreed to share in the cost of this change order in the amount of \$1,423.29. Net cost to the county with Mr. Jones' contribution is \$727.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The contract contains a \$20,000 contingency which is sufficient to cover the cost of this additional work.

## REQUEST TO SUBMIT A GRANT PRE-APPLICATION TO NC RECREATION TRAILS PROGRAM FOR MIDDLE FORK GREENWAY, SECTION 4

#### **MANAGER'S COMMENTS:**

Mr. Joe Furman, Planning and Inspections Director, will request Board authorization to submit a pre-application to the North Carolina Recreational Trails Program for the full amount of \$100,000 for the Middle Fork Greenway, Section 4. A pre-application was submitted two years ago, however at that time only unpaved trails were being funded. This is no longer the case. Blue Ridge Conservancy and Middle Fork Greenway will provide the \$25,000 required match. The total estimate for Section 4 is \$1.4 million. \$200,000 has been approved from the North Carolina Division of Water Resources grant and staff has submitted for \$430,000 grant from the North Carolina PARTF. The remaining cost of the project will be covered by Blue Ridge Conservancy through grant funds from Watauga TDA and fundraising efforts.

Board action is required to authorize the submittal of a pre-application to the North Carolina Recreational Trails Program in the amount of \$100,000 for the Middle Fork Greenway, Section 4.

We encourage readers to read the information presented here in conjunction with additional information that we have furnished in the Organization's financial statements, which follow this narrative.

#### **Financial Highlights**

- The Organization's net position decreased by a total of \$13,504,813 as compared to the previous year end. An amount of \$6,467,871 of this decrease was the funding from the Division of Medical Assistance for the two (2) percent Medicaid risk reserve and the interest earned on the restricted cash.
- Net investment in capital assets decreased by \$818 (or 0.02%) as compared to the previous year's end.
- Unrestricted net position decreased by \$19,971,866 to \$52,532,721 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. The key contributing factor for this decrease was a result of state legislature's requirement in the fiscal year of a single stream replacement requirement (originally \$20,622,914, with a restoration of \$4,047,673, totaling \$16,575,241 net) and a state portion of risk reserve contribution requirement (\$2,325,656).
- The business-type activity operating revenues were \$393,484,247 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017.
- Total operating expenses of all the Organization's programs were \$407,243,345 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017.

#### **Overview of the Financial Statements**

The Organization's basic financial statements consist of three components: 1) the MD&A, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. Because the Organization is a special-purpose government engaged in business-type activities only, the financial statements are presented in accordance with paragraph 138 of GASB Statement No. 34. In addition to the financial statements, this report contains other supplemental information that will enhance the reader's understanding of the financial condition of the Organization. In addition to the management's discussion and analysis, management has prepared the Statement of Net Position, the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position, and the Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Overview of the Organization

The Organization is an Area Authority or multi-county political subdivision of the State of North Carolina operating in accordance with North Carolina General Statute 122C. The Organization's primary mission is to manage a publicly funded health care system which addresses the mental health, substance use and intellectual and developmentally disability needs of citizens in the twenty-three county catchment area. The twenty-three county catchment area comprises the counties of Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe, Avery, Buncombe, Caldwell, Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Macon, Madison, McDowell, Mitchell, Polk, Rutherford, Swain, Transylvania, Watauga, Wilkes and Yancey.

Effective July 1, 2012, the Organization began operating under a Medicaid 1915(b)(c) waiver with the Organization bearing the financial risk. The Organization's operations are funded primarily through Medicaid waiver funds, as well as Federal and state funds from the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services (DMH/DD/SAS).

Effective January 1, 2017, the organization legally changed its name from Smoky Mountain Center for Mental Health, Development Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services to Vaya Health. The name change did not have any impact on the organization's contracts with state agencies or providers.

#### **Fund Financial Statements**

The financial statements are presented on the fund basis. The fund financial statements provide a more detailed look at the Organization's most significant activities by focusing on the individual activities of the major funds. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Organization, like all other governmental entities in North Carolina, uses fund accounting to ensure and reflect compliance, or non-compliance, with finance-related legal requirements, such as the General Statutes (G.S.), the Organization's budget ordinance, or requirements under the Medicaid waivers. The focus is now on the activities of the major funds, and not on the type of fund. The Organization maintains one fund based on its activities as required and for accountability and control. The fund is an enterprise fund which uses the full accrual basis of accounting and accounts for the Organization's activities in a manner similar to a for-profit business.

The Organization adopts an annual budget as required by G.S. 159-42(c). The budget is a legally adopted document that incorporates input from the citizens and the management of the Organization and the decisions of the Board about which services to provide and how to pay for them. The budgetary statements demonstrate how well the Organization complied with the budget ordinance and whether or not the Organization succeeded in providing the services as planned when the budget was adopted. The budgetary comparison statements use the budgetary basis of accounting and are presented using the same format, language, and classifications as the legal budget document. The budgetary statements are presented as supplementary information to demonstrate compliance with applicable state laws. To account for the difference between the budgetary basis of accounting and the full accrual basis, a reconciliation showing the differences in the reported activities is shown at the end of the budgetary statement.

#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

The next section of the financial statements is the notes to the financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the financial statements. The notes to the financial statements are on pages 16-35. After the notes, supplemental information is provided to show details about the Organization's postemployment benefits.

#### Other Information

In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report includes certain required supplementary information required by North Carolina general statutes.

#### Statements of Net Position

Net position may serve over time as one useful indicator of a government's financial condition. The assets of the Organization exceeded liabilities by \$78,822,628 as of June 30, 2017. The Organization uses unrestricted cash to pay providers of services and to manage risk associated with the capitation payments under the Medicaid waivers.

An additional portion of the Organization's net position represents resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used. An amount of 60.2% of the total fund balance is unrestricted while 36.0% of net position is restricted by the Medicaid (b)(c) waiver contract. The remaining balance represents the net investment in fixed assets.

#### Statements of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position

While the Statements of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Position show the change in net position, it also provides answers to the nature and source of these changes.

#### **Capital Asset and Debt Administration**

The Organization's investment in capital assets as of June 30, 2017, 2016 and 2015, totals \$3,329,421, \$3,330,239, and \$3,203,719 (net of accumulated depreciation), respectively, as shown in Table A-3 below. These assets include land and assets in process (which are not depreciated), buildings, leasehold improvements, furniture and other equipment, computer equipment and vehicles. Capital assets increased during the year with additions exceeding depreciation expense.

Restructuring of Mental Health Services in North Carolina.

A major restructuring of the management and delivery systems of mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance use services continues in the state of North Carolina. Significant changes in funding and operations continue to take place as a result of this reform.

Other Factors for the Year Ended June 30, 2018:

a. Effective July 1, 2012, the Organization began operating under a Medicaid 1915 (b)(c) waiver, assuming management of Medicaid funded behavioral health and intellectual/developmental disability services for Medicaid enrollees in the Organization's catchment area. There are now 23 counties in the Organization's catchment area.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of Vaya Health (the Organization) conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant accounting policies.

#### A. Reporting Entity

The Organization is a local management entity (LME) and managed care organization (MCO) designated by and functioning under the control of the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services to provide mental health, developmental disabilities and substance abuse services in Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe, Avery, Buncombe, Caldwell, Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Macon, Madison, McDowell, Mitchell, Polk, Rutherford, Swain, Transylvania, Watauga, Wilkes and Yancey counties. The services include reviewing and evaluating the area needs and programs in mental health, mental impairment, alcoholism, drug dependency and related fields, and developing jointly with the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, an annual plan for the effective development, use and control of state and local facilities and resources in a comprehensive program of mental health service for the residents of the area. The Organization, which is governed by a twenty-one member board of directors, is an area authority empowered by Chapter 122C of the North Carolina General Statutes with the responsibility to oversee and control all activities related to mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse services in its target area. The Organization has no component units, which under generally accepted accounting principles are legally separate entities for which the Organization is financially accountable.

Effective January 1, 2017, the organization legally changed its name from Smoky Mountain Center for Mental Health, Development Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services to Vaya Health. The name change did not have any impact on the organization's contracts with state agencies or providers.

#### B. Basis of Presentation, Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Organization are organized and operated on a fund basis. A fund is an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording its assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflows of resources, net position, revenues, and expenses.

The Organization accounts for its operations as an enterprise fund. An enterprise fund is used to account for operations (a) that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises — where the intent of the governing body is that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges; or (b) where the governing body has decided that periodic determination of revenue earned, expenses incurred, and/or net income is appropriate for capital maintenance, public policy, management control, accountability, or other purposes.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### B. Basis of Presentation, Fund Accounting (Continued)

The Enterprise Fund is the major operating fund of the Organization which accounts for all activity. The Enterprise Fund financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred, regardless of when the related cash flows take place. Non-exchange transactions, in which the Organization gives (or receives) value without directly receiving (or giving) equal value in exchange, include grants, entitlements, and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Activity related to the internal service fund of the Organization has been presented with the major operating fund for reporting purposes. The internal service fund was used in the past by the Organization to account for health and dental insurance to employees and eligible retirees.

Amounts reported as revenues include: 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions, including special assessments. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues.

Intergovernmental revenues are not susceptible to accrual because generally they are not measurable until received in cash. Expenditure-driven grants are recognized as revenue when the qualifying expenditures have been incurred and all other grant requirements have been satisfied.

All funds of the Organization are maintained on the modified accrual basis during the year; however, the financial statements for the Organization have been reported on the accrual basis. Under this basis, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when incurred. In converting from the modified accrual basis to the full accrual basis, the changes required may include adjustments for depreciation, capital outlay, compensated absences, and other postemployment benefits.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### C. Budgetary Data

The Organization maintains budgetary controls over all funds, as required by the North Carolina General Statutes. An annual budget is adopted for the Enterprise Fund. All annual appropriations lapse at the fiscal year-end. All budgets are prepared using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Expenditures may not legally exceed appropriations at the functional level for all annually budgeted funds. Amendments are required for any revisions that alter total expenditures of any fund or that change functional appropriations by more than \$5,000. The governing board must approve all amendments. During the year, several allocation letters caused budget revision amendments to the original budget were necessary. The budget ordinance must be adopted by July 1 of the fiscal year or the governing board must adopt an interim budget that covers that time until the annual ordinance can be adopted. The budget was prepared on the modified accrual basis of accounting. The budget presented in these statements is the budget ordinance amended through June 30, 2017.

#### D. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position

#### 1. Deposits and Investments

All deposits of the Organization are made in board-designated official depositories and are secured as required by G.S. 159-31. The Organization may designate, as an official depository, any bank or savings association whose principal office is located in North Carolina. Also, the Organization may establish time deposit accounts such as NOW and SuperNOW accounts, money market accounts, and certificates of deposit.

State law [G.S. 159-30(c)] authorizes the Organization to invest in obligations of the United States or obligations fully guaranteed both as to principal and interest by the United States; obligations of the State of North Carolina; bonds and notes of any North Carolina local government or public Organization; obligations of certain non-guaranteed Federal agencies; certain high quality issues of commercial paper and bankers' acceptances and the North Carolina Capital Management Trust (NCCMT). The Organization's investments are reported at fair value. The NCCMT Cash Portfolio, an SEC-registered (2a-7) external investment pool, is measured at amortized cost, which is the NCCMT's share price. The NCCMT Term Portfolio's securities are valued at fair value.

#### 2. Cash and Cash Equivalents

All cash and investments are essentially demand deposits and are considered cash and cash equivalents. The Organization considers demand deposits and investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less, which are not limited as to use, to be cash and cash equivalents.

Restricted cash consists of cash required to be set aside in a separate account by the Medicaid waiver.

#### NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### D. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position (Continued)

#### 3. Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

All receivables that historically experience uncollectible accounts are shown net of an allowance for doubtful accounts. This amount is estimated by analyzing the percentage of receivables that were written off in prior years and evaluating current information related to the collectability of individual receivables.

#### 4. Prepaid Items

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in the financial statements.

#### 5. Capital Assets

Purchased or constructed capital assets are reported at cost or estimated historical cost. Donated capital assets are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets' lives are not capitalized.

#### 6. Long-Term Obligations

Long-term obligations are reported as liabilities and classified as short-term or long-term depending on their respective maturities.

#### 7. Compensated Absences

The annual leave policy of the Organization provides for the accumulation of up to two hundred and forty (240) hours earned annual leave with such leave being fully vested when earned. An expense and a liability for compensated absences and the salary-related payments are recorded as the leave is earned. The portion of that time that is estimated to be used in the next fiscal year has been designated as a current portion in the financial statements.

#### 7. Compensated Absences (Continued)

The sick leave policy of the Organization provides for an unlimited accumulation of earned sick leave. Sick leave does not vest, but any unused sick leave accumulated at the time of retirement may be used in the determination of length of service for retirement benefit purposes. Since the Organization has no obligation for accumulated sick leave until it is actually taken, no accrual for sick leave has been made.

#### 8. Deferred Lease Liability

Rent expenses are reported on a straight-line basis. Differences between monthly rent expenses and rent payments are recorded as a deferred rent liability and adjustment to straight-line is amortized over the life of the lease term. The reported liability relates to the office building in Sylva, North Carolina.

#### 9. Pension Plans

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Local Governmental Employees' Retirement System (LGERS) and additions to/deductions from LGERS' fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by LGERS. For this purpose, plan member contributions are recognized in the period in which the contributions are due. The Organization's employer contributions are recognized when due and the Organization has a legal requirement to provide the contributions. Benefits and refunds are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the terms of LGERS. Investments are reported at fair value.

#### 10. Deferred Outflows and Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate selection for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statements element, *Deferred Outflows of Resources*, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an expense or expenditure until then. The Organization has several items that meet this criterion - contributions made to the pension plan in the 2017 fiscal year, changes of assumptions, net difference between projected and actual earnings on pension plan assets, and changes in proportion and differences between the Organization's contributions and proportionate share of contributions.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statements element, *Deferred Inflows of Resources*, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as revenue until then. The Organization has one item that meets this criterion – differences between expected and actual experience.

#### 11. Net Position

Net position is classified into three parts: net investment in capital assets, restricted, and unrestricted. Unrestricted net position includes the portion of net position that bears no restriction as to use or purpose. Net investment in capital assets includes resources invested in capital assets. Restricted net position includes revenue resources that are restricted to specific purposes externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or imposed by law. Amounts restricted for the Medicaid Risk Reserve include the portion of net position that is restricted by the Medicaid 1915 b/c waiver.

#### NOTE 2 DETAILED NOTES ON ALL FUNDS

#### A. Assets

#### 1. Cash and Cash Equivalents

All of the Organization's deposits are either insured or collateralized by using one of two methods. Under the Dedicated Method, all deposits exceeding the Federal Depository Insurance coverage level are collateralized with securities held by the Organization in its name. Under the Pooling Method, which is a collateral pool, all uninsured deposits are collateralized with securities held by the State Treasurer's agent in the name of the State Treasurer. Since the State Treasurer is acting in a fiduciary capacity for the Organization, these deposits are considered to be held by their agents in the entity's name. The amount of the pledged collateral is based on an approved averaging method for non-interest bearing deposits and the actual current balance for interest-bearing deposits. Depositories using the Pooling Method report to the State Treasurer the adequacy of their pooled collateral covering uninsured deposits. The State Treasurer does not confirm this information with the Organization or with the escrow agent. Because of the inability to measure the exact amount of collateral pledged for the Organization under the Pooling Method, the potential exists for undercollaterization, and this risk may increase in periods of high cash flows. However, the State Treasurer of North Carolina enforces strict standards of financial stability for each depository that collateralizes public deposits under the Pooling Method. The Organization has no formal policy regarding custodial credit risks for deposits, but relies on the State Treasurer to enforce standards of minimum capitalization for all Pooling Method financial institutions and to monitor them for compliance.

#### 1. Cash and Cash Equivalents (Continued)

At June 30, 2017, the Organization's deposits had a carrying amount of \$87,243,360 and a bank balance of \$88,029,629. Of the bank balance, \$500,000 was covered by Federal Depository Insurance; \$87,529,629 in interest bearing deposits was covered by collateral held under the Pooling Method.

At June 30, 2017, the Organization had \$1,425 of cash on hand.

#### 2. Investments

The Organization measures and records its investments using fair value measurement guidelines established by generally accepted accounting principles. These guidelines recognize a three-tiered fair value hierarchy, as follows:

Level 1: Quoted prices for identical investments in active markets;

Level 2: Observable inputs other than quoted market prices; and,

Level 3: Unobservable inputs.

#### 2. Pension Plan Obligations, Other Employment Benefits, and Other Postemployment Benefits

#### a. Retirement Plan

Plan Description. The Organization is a participating employer in the statewide Local Governmental Employees' Retirement System (LGERS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of North Carolina. LGERS membership is comprised of general employees of participating local governmental entities. Article 3 of G.S. Chapter 128 assigns the authority to establish and amend benefit provisions to the North Carolina General Assembly. Management of the plan is vested in the LGERS Board of Trustees, which consists of 13 members – nine appointed by the Governor, one appointed by the State Senate, one appointed by the State House of Representatives, and the State Treasurer and State Superintendent, who serve as exofficio members. The Local Governmental Employees' Retirement System is included in the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the State of North Carolina. The State's CAFR includes financial statements and required supplementary information for LGERS. That report may be obtained by writing to the Office of the State Controller, 1410 Mail Service Center, Raleigh, North Carolina 27699-1410, by calling (919) 981-5454, or at www.osc.nc.gov.

Benefits Provided. LGERS provides retirement and survivor benefits. Retirement benefits are determined as 1.85% of the member's average final compensation times the member's years of creditable service. A member's average final compensation is calculated as the average of a member's four highest consecutive years of compensation. Plan members are eligible to retire with full retirement benefits at age 65 with five years of creditable service, at age 60 with 25 years of creditable service, or at any age with 30 years of creditable service. Plan members are eligible to retire with partial retirement benefits at age 50 with 20 years of creditable service or at age 60 with five years of creditable service. Survivor benefits are available to eligible beneficiaries of members who die while in active service or within 180 days of their last day of service and who have either completed 20 years of creditable service regardless of age or have completed five years of service and have reached age 60.

Eligible beneficiaries may elect to receive a monthly Survivor's Alternate Benefit for life or a return of the member's contributions. The plan does not provide for automatic post-retirement benefit increases. Increases are contingent upon actuarial gains of the plan.

Contributions. Contribution provisions are established by General Statute 128-30 and may be amended only by the North Carolina General Assembly. The Organization's employees are required to contribute 6% of their compensation. Employer contributions are actuarially determined and set annually by the LGERS Board of Trustees. The Organization's contractually required contribution rate for the year ended June 30, 2017, was 7.25% for general employees, actuarially determined as an amount that, when combined with employee contributions, is expected to finance the costs of benefits earned by employees during the year. Contributions to the pension plan from the Organization were approximately \$1,954,000 for the year ended June 30, 2017.

At June 30, 2017, the Organization reported a liability of approximately \$8,469,000 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability was measured as of June 30, 2016. The total pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of December 31, 2015. The total pension liability was then rolled forward to the measurement date of June 30, 2016 utilizing update procedures incorporating the actuarial assumptions. The Organization's proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the Organization's long-term share of future payroll covered by the pension plan, relative to the projected future payroll covered by the pension plan of all participating LGERS employers, actuarially determined. At June 30, 2016, the Organization's proportion was 0.399%.

For the year ended June 30, 2017, the Organization recognized pension expense of approximately \$2,833,000. At June 30, 2017, the Organization reported deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions from the following sources:

Actuarial Assumptions. The total pension liability in the December 31, 2015 actuarial valuation was determined using the following actuarial assumptions, applied to all periods included in the measurement:

The plan currently uses mortality tables that vary by age, gender, and health status (i.e. disabled and healthy). The current mortality rates are based on published tables and based on studies that cover significant portions of the U.S. population. The healthy mortality rates also contain a provision to reflect future mortality improvements.

The actuarial assumptions used in the December 31, 2015 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period January 1, 2010 through December 31, 2014.

Future ad hoc Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) amounts are not considered to be substantively automatic and are therefore not included in the measurement.

The projected long-term investment returns and inflation assumptions are developed through review of current and historical capital markets data, sell-side investment research, consultant whitepapers, and historical performance of investment strategies. Fixed income return projections reflect current yields across the U.S. Treasury yield curve and market expectations of forward yields projected and interpolated for multiple tenors and over multiple year horizons. Global public equity return projections are established through analysis of the equity risk premium and the fixed income return projections. Other asset categories and strategies' return projections reflect the foregoing and historical data analysis. These projections are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation.

The long-term nominal rates of return underlying the real rates of return are arithmetic annualized figures. Discount Rate. The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.25%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members will be made at the current contribution rate and that contributions from employers will be made at statutorily required rates, actuarially determined. Based on these assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of the current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Sensitivity of the Organization's proportionate share of the net pension asset to changes in the discount rate. Plan Description. The Organization administers a defined benefit Employment Benefit Fund (EBF). As of September 2004, Organization employees who retire and draw benefits from the Local Government Employees' Retirement System (LGERS) have the ability to continue their health and dental coverage under the Organization's EBF. The Organization will provide a percentage of the cost of coverage based on the number of years of service and the employee's age at the time of retirement. Funding Policy. The Organization pays the cost of coverage for the health care benefits paid to qualified retirees under a Board resolution that can be amended by the Board. The Organization has chosen to fund the health care benefits on a pay as you go basis.

The current ARC rate is 1.0% of annual covered payroll. For the current year, the Organization contributed \$45,314, or 0.18% of annual covered payroll. The Organization obtains insurance through private insurers for health care coverage. The Organization is not required to make contributions at a specified percentage of covered payroll. Contributions made by retired employees, which includes dependent coverage, totaled \$19,223 in the year ended June 30, 2017.

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies. The Plan's financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Plan member contributions are recognized in the period in which the contributions are due. Contributions are recognized when due, and the Organization will provide the contributions to the Plan. Benefits and refunds are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the terms of each plan. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations. Short-term money market debt instruments, deposits, and repurchase agreements are reported at cost or amortized cost, which approximates fair value. Certain longer term United States Government and United States Agency securities are valued at the last reported sales price. Administration costs of the Plan are financed through investment earnings.

Annual OPEB Cost and Net OPEB Obligation. The Organization's annual other post-employment benefit (OPEB) cost (expense) is calculated based on the annual required contribution (ARC) of the employer, an amount actuarially determined in accordance with the parameters of GASB Statement No. 45. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities (or funding excess) over a period not to exceed thirty years. The following table shows the components of the Organization's annual OPEB cost for the current year, the amount actually contributed to the plan, and changes in the Organization's net OPEB obligation for the postemployment health care benefits:

Fund Status and Funding Progress. As of June 30, 2016, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the plan was not funded. The actuarial accrued liability for benefits was \$966,754 and the actuarial value of assets was \$0, resulting in an unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) of \$966,754. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active employees covered by the plan) was \$24,821,723 and the ratio of the UAAL to the covered payroll was 3.9 percent.

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality, and health care cost trend. Amounts determined regarding the funded status of the plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The Schedule of Funding Progress, presented as required supplementary information following the notes to the financial statements, presents multi-year trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing, over time, relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

Actuarial Methods and Assumptions. Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan (the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members) and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members at that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

In the June 30, 2016 actuarial valuation, the projected unit credit actuarial cost method was used. The actuarial assumptions included a 4.00 percent investment rate of return (net of administrative expenses), which is the blended rate of the expected long-term investment returns on plan assets and on the employer's own investments calculated based on the funded level of the plan at the valuation date and an annual medical cost of 8 percent annually with a trend decrease of 0.5 percent annually until an ultimate rate of 5 percent is reached. The dental cost trend increase of 5.00 percent was assumed. The actuarial value of assets, if any, was determined using techniques that spread the effects of short-term volatility in the market value of investments over a five-year period. The UAAL is being amortized as a level percentage of pay on an open basis. The remaining amortization period at June 30, 2016, was 20 years.

#### c. Other Employment Benefits

The Organization has elected to provide death benefits to employees through the Death Benefit Plan for members of the Local Governmental Employees' Retirement System (Death Benefit Plan), a multiple-employer, State-administered, cost-sharing plan funded on a one-year term cost basis. The beneficiaries of those employees who die in active service after one year of contributing membership in the System, or who die within 180 days after retirement or termination of service and have at least one year of contributing membership service in the System at the time of death are eligible for death benefits. Lump-sum death benefit payments to beneficiaries are equal to the employee's 12 highest months' salary in a row during the 24 months prior to the employee's death, but the benefit will be a minimum of \$25,000 and will not exceed \$50,000. All death benefit payments are made from the Death Benefit Plan. The Organization has no liability beyond the payment of monthly contributions. The contributions to the Death Benefit Plan cannot be separated between the postemployment benefit amount and the other benefit amount. The Organization considers these contributions to be immaterial.

#### 3. Risk Management

The Organization is exposed to various risks of losses related to torts; malpractice; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The Organization carries commercial insurance to cover substantially all risks of loss. The Organization obtains commercial general liability and professional liability coverage of \$2,000,000 per occurrence subject to a \$3,000,000 limit, liability and collision insurance coverage on vehicles of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, and workers' compensation coverage subject to a limit of \$1,000,000.

The Organization does not carry flood insurance as there are no properties located within areas designated as flood areas.

The Organization carries commercial coverage for all other risks of loss. There have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage from the previous year and settled claims have not exceeded coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

In accordance with G.S. 159.29, the Organization's employees that have access to \$100 or more at a given time of the Organization's funds are performance bonded through a commercial surety bond. The Chief Executive Officer and the Chief Finance Officer are individually bonded for \$250,000.

#### 4. Contingent Liabilities

From time to time, the Organization is party to other pending claims and legal proceedings. Although the outcome of such matters cannot be forecast with certainty, it is the opinion of management and legal counsel that the likelihood is remote that any such claims or proceedings will have a material adverse effect on the Organization's financial position or results of operations.

### RESOLUTION ORDERING THE REFERENDUM FOR A QUARTER-CENT LOCAL OPTION SALES TAX WITH THE PROCEEDS TO BE UTILIZED FOR A 2 CENT PROPERTY TAX RATE REDUCTION IN WATAUGA COUNTY

**WHEREAS,** Article 46, Subchapter 8, Chapter 105 of the North Carolina General Statutes (§105-535 through 538) provides counties with the authority to levy a local sales and use tax at a rate of one-quarter percent (0.25%); and

**WHEREAS,** the Watauga County property tax rate is currently \$0.353 and is the third lowest in the State of North Carolina; and

**WHEREAS,** the Watauga County Board of Commissioners discussed levying a local sales and use tax at a rate of one-quarter percent (0.25%) at their Annual Budget Retreat in 2017; and

**WHEREAS,** the proceeds from the additional one-quarter percent (0.25%) local sales and use tax would be used to reduce the property tax rate from \$0.353 to \$0.333.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, pursuant to North Carolina General Statute 105-537, that the Watauga County Board of Commissioners hereby requests that the Watauga County Board of Elections conduct a special election advisory referendum on the 47th 8th day of May, 2018, for all of Watauga County with the following ballot question:

"[]FOR []AGAINST

**ADOPTED** this the 6<sup>th</sup> day of February 2018

Local sales and use tax at the rate of one-quarter percent (0.25%) in addition to all other State and local sales and use taxes."

**FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED** that the Watauga County Board of Commissioners requests that, at such time the special election voting data is tabulated and certified, the Board of Elections forward said advisory referendum results to the Board of Commissioners in order to proceed as allowed in the above referenced statutes in Chapter 105 of the North Carolina General Statutes; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the proceeds generated from this additional one-quarter percent (0.25%) sales tax shall be utilized to reduce the current property tax rate of \$0.353 by 2 cents and establishing the new property tax rate for Watauga County at \$0.333.

### **MANAGER'S COMMENTS:**

#### Watauga County Board of Adjustment

The terms of Bill Ragan, Baxter Palmer and Todd Rice expired in November. All three are willing to continue to serve if reappointed. NC Statutes require a representative (resident) of each zoned area in counties that have partial-county zoning such as Watauga. Mr. Rice represents the Valle Crucis Historic District, which is a small area with limited population, therefore small pool of potential representatives. Mr. Palmer is the alternate member and is the representative of the Foscoe-Grandfather zoned area. Mr. Ragan resides in the Howard Creek Watershed, which is not a zoned area in the traditional sense, but since the watershed ordinance was adopted under zoning authority, the County has attempted to appoint residents of those areas when possible.

The Pond Creek (Beech Mountain) Watershed Ordinance was not adopted under zoning authority as it is not large enough to qualify for partial-county zoning. Adam Rhyne resides in the South Fork New River/Winkler Creek/Middle Fork watershed (the boundaries adjoin and form one larger watershed-regulated area). David Hill and Charles Phillips are at-large members. Those 3 terms are not expiring this year. The new South Fork New River Watershed for the new Boone water intake does not have a representative.

Volunteer applications have been received from Mr. John Prickett, Mr. Joe Quinn, Mr. Michael Moore, and Ms. Alyson Browett. All four requested to serve on the Board of Adjustment; however, upon review, Mr. Moore's application indicates he lives in the Foscoe-Grandfather Community. He does not live within the zoned area or the community council designated area.

Mr. Prickett and Mr. Quinn are second readings and Ms. Browett is a first reading and, therefore, action may be taken if so desired.

#### Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee

Mr. Harold Eller's term will expire March 3, 2018, on the Watauga County Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee. He is willing to continue to serve an additional three-year term if reappointed. This is a second reading and, therefore, action may be taken if so desired.

#### *Tourism Development Authority (TDA)*

The terms of Mr. Jim Neustadt and Mr. Brad Moretz will expire February 28, 2018. The two seats must be occupied by someone representing a business that collects the occupancy tax in Watauga County. Mr. Wright Tilley, Watauga County TDA Director, has stated that both are willing to continue to serve an additional three-year term if reappointed. Ms. Alyson Browett

submitted an application indicating her interest in serving on the TDA; however, Mr. Wright Tilley has stated that she does not appear to meet the requirements of the TDA seats listed above. Only owners or operators of lodging properties that collect the occupancy tax in Watauga County are eligible for consideration of these seats. This is a second reading and, therefore, action may be taken if so desired.

### WAMY Community Action

Ms. Joy Coffey's final term as a Public Sector representative for Watauga County ends on February 8, 2018. Ms. Melissa Soto, Executive Director of WAMY, requests a Commissioner or appointee be appointed to fill the four-year term.
