The Watauga County Board of Commissioners held a regular meeting, as scheduled, on Tuesday, December 7, 2021, at 5:30 P.M. in the Commissioners' Board Room located in the Watauga County Administration Building, Boone, North Carolina.

Chairman Welch called the meeting to order at 5:33 P.M. The following were present:

PRESENTATION OF NC COOPERATIVE EXTENSION COUNTY PARTNERSHIP AWARD

Ms. Kelley Heimstra, West District Director for Cooperative Extension, presented a 2021 NC Cooperative Extension County Partnership Award to the Board of Commissioners. One award was given in each of the five districts throughout the state. Ms. Heimstra stated that Mr. Jim Hamilton, Watauga County Extension Director, had written the nomination and it reflected the outstanding team comprised of the Extension and County.

Mr. Hamilton shared that the Extension had recently learned of additional grant funds that would be received for the proposed Kill/Chill facility from the Appalachian Regional Commission and the Tobacco Trust Fund. An application would also be submitted to the North Carolina Agriculture Development Trust Fund.

PRESENTATION OF FY 2021 AUDIT

Ms. Cindy Randolph with C. Randolph, CPA, PLLC presented the Fiscal Year 2021 County Audit. Ms. Randolph stated that the County was in excellent financial state. This was due to the direction provided by the Commissioners and through execution of that direction by County staff. Financial highlights are listed below:

• The total assets of the County exceeded its liabilities at the close of the fiscal year by \$190,957,610.

- The County's unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$34,873,904 at the end of the year, representing 61.7% of total General Fund expenditures. This is an increase of \$9,647,783 in the unassigned fund balance from the previous year.
- The current year collection rate for property taxes was 98.88% which was an increase from last year's 98.59%. The County is still well above the statewide average of 98.11% for entities of similar populations in fiscal year 2019-20.
- Outstanding debt principal decreased by \$4,980,000. Total outstanding debt principal at June 30, 2021 is \$41,210,000. Watauga County's legal debt limit is \$720,972,511 so the County continues to be well below the state limits.
- S&P updated their review of the County's financials and reaffirmed the County's stable outlook and credit rating at AA.

The audit was presented for information only; and therefore, no action was required.

County Manager Geouque stated that, due to another successful year and an increase in the unassigned fund balance, staff recommended appropriating \$4,200,000 to restore the long-term capital for the Watauga County School System for the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2021, and to transfer to the Capital Projects Fund \$5,400,000 for a future parking deck and \$47,783 for future facilities maintenance.

Commissioner Turnbow, seconded by Commissioner Wallin, moved to authorize the transfer of the \$9,647,783 increase from unassigned balance as presented by the County Manager.

SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION FUNDING ACCEPTANCE AGREEMENT

Mr. Graham Fox with Watauga Soil and Water Conservation District presented the 2021-2023 technical assistance grant which funds a portion of the Soil and Water Conservation Tech position. The grant was in the amount of \$31,311 and was budgeted in the Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budget.

Vice-Chairman Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Pertalion, moved to accept the grant as presented.

County Manager Geouque stated that the 2021 Program Records Schedule for Local Government Agencies was a new retention schedule created from the former County Management (last updated in 2013) and Municipal (last updated in 2012) retention schedules. The schedule contained specific functions of government at the county and municipal level. If the Board chose to not adopt the new retention schedule the County would be required to create their own schedule. The "Agency Policy: Destroy in office after _____" sections had been filled in with "one day" in prior schedules.

Vice-Chairman Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Pertalion, moved to adopt the General Records Retention and Disposition Schedule for Local Government Agencies as presented.

REQUEST FOR DECLARATION OF SURPLUS AND SALE – WCSO K-9

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Major Redmon will request to declare "Elvis" a K-9 police dog as surplus and sale to its handler, Lt. Rick Ruppert. Major Redmon has indicated that due to Elvis' age and hip issues, the K-9 must be retired for use by the Sheriff's Office. General Statutes allow for the dog to be sold for a negotiated price by order of the Board of Commissioners. For staff to carry out the order, the Board must adopt a resolution and advertise the sale for ten (10) days prior to the sale. Major Redmon requests that the dog be declared surplus and sold for a fee of \$1.00 to its handler. Since the K-9 has been trained for duty, it would be best for an experienced handler to have ownership.

Board action is required to declare Elvis surplus and adopt the resolution, and advertise the sale for ten (10) days prior to the sale. Upon completion of the ten-day notice, Elvis will be presented to Lt. Ruppert who will bare all future expenses related to the medical, care and housing of Elvis.

Resolution Authorizing the Sale of Personal Property Worth Less Than \$30,000 (G.S. 160A-266; 267)

WHEREAS, Watauga County owns certain items of personal property that have become surplus for its current needs; and

WHEREAS, the Watauga County Sheriff's Office has a K-9 named Elvis that has reached the age and work life for a law enforcement K-9; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute § 160A-266 permits the county to sell such property by private sale, upon authorization by the Board of Commissioners at a regular meeting and notice to the public; and

WHEREAS, the Watauga County Board of Commissioners is convened in a regular meeting.
