### WATAUGA COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TUESDAY, DECEMBER 20, 2022

The Watauga County Board of Commissioners held a regular meeting, as scheduled, on Tuesday, December 20, 2022, at 5:30 P.M. in the Commissioners' Board Room located in the Watauga County Administration Building, Boone, North Carolina.

Chairman Turnbow called the meeting to order at 5:32 P.M. The following were present:

Commissioner Wallin opened with a prayer and Commissioner Eggers led the Pledge of Allegiance.

### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Chairman Turnbow called for additions and/or corrections to the December 5, 2022, regular meeting and closed session minutes.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Commissioner Wallin, moved to approve the December 5, 2022, regular meeting minutes as presented.

# **APPROVAL OF AGENDA**

Chairman Turnbow called for additions and/or corrections to the December 20, 2022, agenda.

Commissioner Castle, seconded by Commissioner Eggers, moved to approve the December 20, 2022, agenda as presented.

### PRESENTATION OF FY 2022 AUDIT

Ms. Cindy Randolph with C. Randolph, CPA, PLLC presented the Fiscal Year 2022 County audit. The County's financial position remained strong due to the direction provided by the Commissioners and carried out by County staff. Ms. Randolph reviewed the following financial highlights:

- ❖ The total assets of the County exceeded its liabilities at the close of the fiscal year by \$26,236,241 primarily due to an increase in cash assets from revenues, particularly sales tax and property tax.
- ❖ The County's unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$40,373,975 at the end of the year, representing 67% of total General Fund expenditures. This is an increase of \$5,500,071 in the unassigned fund balance from the previous year.
- ❖ The current year collection rate for property taxes was 98.70% which was a small decrease from last year's 98.88%. The County is still well above the statewide average of 98.11% for entities of similar populations in fiscal year 2021-22.
- ❖ Outstanding debt principal decreased by \$5,000,000. Total outstanding debt principal at June 30, 2022 is \$36,210,000. Watauga County's legal debt limit is \$736,696,757 so the County continues to be well below the state limits.
- ❖ S&P updated their review of the County's financials and reaffirmed the County's stable outlook and credit rating at AA.

When asked by Commissioner Russell if there were any adverse findings, Ms. Randolph stated that there was one small finding and a corrective action plan was devised and was now being utilized.

The audit was presented for information only and, therefore, no action was required.

County Manager Geouque stated that, due to strong fiscal management and the increase in the unassigned fund balance, staff recommended to transfer \$2,500,000 to the Capital Projects Fund, \$2,500,000 to the parking deck project, and \$500,071 to the 911/Medic/Emergency Operations facility and for future facilities maintenance.

Commissioner Wallin, seconded by Commissioner Russell, moved to authorize the transfer of the \$5,500,071 increase from unassigned balance to the Capital Reserve Account as presented by the County Manager.

# NORTHERN PEAKS STATE TRAIL (NPST) UPDATE AND PROPOSED RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE TRAIL

Mr. Jordan Sellers, Northern Peaks Trail Coordinator, provided an update on the Northern Peaks State Trail (NPST). The Trail would connect the Towns of Boone and West Jefferson by traversing the Northern Peaks, also know as the Amphibolite Mountains (including Howard Knob, Snake Mountain, Elk Knob, The Peak, Three Top Mountain, Paddy Mountain, and Mount Jefferson), which divide the New River and Watauga River watersheds. The final route was still under consideration. The nature of the trail was to connect people to nature, fragmented wildlife habitat, Boone to West Jefferson, and visitors and dollars to the High Country. The project would begin by identifying suitable properties and working with land owners. Next, a biological survey would be completed to avoid natural heritage element occurrences and then a professional trail builder would create the trail. Finally, the trail would be completed which would in turn make all the connections mentioned above. The NPST was designated as a State Trail in 2019 and the funding for the biological survey was secured in 2022. Since that time, a \$3.4 million PARTF grant was awarded to Elk Knob State Park for a 4.5-mile loop as well as a summit approach trailhead, parking, a bridge, and restrooms. Groundbreaking for the project would be in 2023. Mr. Sellers presented a proposed resolution in support of the trail. Chairman Turnbow read the resolution.

Commissioner Russell, seconded by Commissioner Wallin, moved to adopt the resolution of support for the Northern Peaks State Trail (NPST) as presented.

## **HIGH COUNTRY CAREGIVERS PRESENTATION**

On behalf of Ms. Pana Columbus, Mr. Jacob Willis, Executive Director of High Country Caregivers, presented an overview of the organization. The organization was founded to help provide respite care for those caring for others. Over time the main focus transitioned to providing aid to grandparents who were raising grandchildren with respite care remaining in place as well. Mr. Willis stated that there were currently 71 caregivers and 83 children receiving support from the High Country Caregivers. Over the past three years, High Country Caregivers has spent \$175,000 in legal fees to assist grandparents in gaining custody of their grandchildren which would keep the children out of the system. The local Department of Social Services and the school system provides referrals. The High Country Caregivers also provide camps for childcare while grandparents work. Mr. Willis thanked the Board members for the work they do. The report was for information only and, therefore, no action was required.

# **SHERIFF'S OFFICE MATTERS**

### A. Requested Award to Retiring Officer

Chairman Turnbow, on behalf of Major Redmon, stated that Lieutenant Rick Ruppert was retiring February 1, 2023, and the Sheriff's Office had requested his side arm and badge be awarded to him upon retirement.

G.S. 20-187.2 allowed governing bodies of a law enforcement agency to award a retiring member the service side arm at a price determined by the governing body. Law enforcement personnel may retire at age 55 with 25 years of credible service with full retirement benefits. The price of the side arm was suggested at \$1.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Commissioner Castle, moved to award Lieutenant Rick Ruppert's side arm and badge to him upon retirement and set the price of the side arm at \$1.

## B. Proposed Resolution in Support of Naming the Watauga River Bridge after Sergeant Christopher David Ward

Chairman Turnbow, on behalf of Major Redmon, stated that steps were being taken to name the Highway 321 Watauga River Bridge in memory of Sergeant Christopher David Ward.

The procedures for naming roads/bridges/ferries by NCDOT included adopting a resolution and submitting background information on the nominee, description of what was being requested to be named, and public input and support to NCDOT staff. NCDOT staff would then review the information to ensure the application met policy and would confirm that there was not any local opposition. After review the NCDOT staff would forward to the Transportation Road, Bridge, and Ferry Naming Committee for action. The Board member representing the area where the requested bridge was located must endorse the request. If approved, the Transportation Road, Bridge, and Ferry Naming Committee would forward a resolution for the Board of Transportation's approval. The Board of Transportation would then approve or deny the request.

In an effort to meet the public forum requirement by the NCDOT, staff recommended a public hearing be scheduled for the January 17, 2023. The public hearing was not required but would provide an opportunity to share the required public input and support with NCDOT. A proposed resolution was presented of which, upon completion of the public hearing, the Board could adopt and forward to NCDOT for consideration. There was also a \$2,000 fee for the signs and installation which was proposed to be paid by the County.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Commissioner Castle, moved to proceed with the Bridge naming; however, Chairman Turnbow tabled consideration until a public hearing was held.

By consensus, the Board agreed to hold a public hearing on Tuesday, January 17, 2023, at 5:30 P.M. to allow citizen comment regarding the request to name the Highway 321 Bridge over Watauga River near Watauga River Road in memory of Sergeant Christopher David Ward.

County Manager Geouque stated that the Sheriff's Office has been in contact with Deputy Logan Fox's father who was still considering naming options to honor his son.

### SPECIAL PRESENTATION BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Chairman Turnbow stated that Planning and Inspections/Economic Development Director, Joe Furman, was retiring and read a proclamation honoring Mr. Furman's thirty-eight years of service to the County. Chairman Turnbow presented the proclamation to Mr. Furman who thanked the Board and stated that it had been a pleasure working for the County and looked forward to continuing to have a role with economic development through the Chamber of Commerce.

### MIDDLE FORK GREENWAY MATTER

Proposed modification to the Resolution – Water Resources Development Grant Adopted June 7, 2022.

Mr. Joe Furman, Planning and Inspections Director, stated that a Water Resources Development Grant Resolution was adopted by the Board at the June 7, 2022, meeting. The purpose of the resolution was for the County to sponsor the Middle Fork Greenway, Boone Gorge Park Development. The Resolution stated, "The Board requests the State of North Carolina to provide financial assistance to Watauga County for Middle Fork Greenway in the amount of \$500,000 or 20 percent of the construction cost, whichever was the lesser amount." The item should have stated 30 percent which takes into consideration the total project implementation and not just construction costs. Chairman Turnbow read the resolution.

Commissioner Russell, seconded by Commissioner Wallin, moved to amend the Resolution - Water Resources Development Grant Adopted June 7, 2022 to state 30 percent instead of 20 percent as presented by Mr. Furman.

### REQUEST TO APPLY FOR LOCAL ASSISTANCE AND TRIBAL CONSISTENCY FUND

Ms. Samantha Jones, Finance Director, requested approval to apply for funds from the Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund Grant and to accept the funds, if granted, which would be in the amount of \$100,000 (\$50,000 FY 2022, \$50,000 FY 2023). The funds would be used to pay for unanticipated increases in Sheriff, Maintenance, Emergency Management, and Animal Control vehicles.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Commissioner Castle, moved to authorize staff to apply, accept, and expend funds from the Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund Grant as requested by Ms. Jones.

### MISCELLANEOUS ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS

### A. Proposed SECU ATM Lease Renewal

County Manager Geouque stated that the County was recently contacted by the State Employees Credit Union regarding the ATM lease at the Human Services Complex. Initially, the Credit Union proposed removing the ATM due to cost cutting measures. However, County staff requested the ATM remain as it serves the Social Services Department, DayMark Recovery, Project on Aging, NC Works, AppHealthCare, and citizens that reside on the western side of the county. After negotiations, staff was able to secure the lease for an additional three (3) years. A reduction in the current lease payment from \$450 to \$250 per month would allow for the ATM to remain at the current location. No other changes were made to the current agreement.

The County Manager stated that the Credit Union has been a good steward and that staff would recommend the Board approve the lease agreement for \$250 a month for a three (3) year period beginning January 1, 2023. County Attorney Capua stated that she had reviewed the contract and suggested amending the lessor name to "Watauga County" not "Watauga County Finance Department."

Commissioner Wallin, seconded by Commissioner Russell, moved to approve the lease agreement, including amending the lessor name to "Watauga County" for \$250 a month for a three (3) year period effective January 1, 2023.

### Economic Development Commission

The Voluntary Farmland Preservation Program Advisory Board recommended the re-appointment of Kelly Coffey and Joe McNeil. Each were willing to continue to serve if so reappointed.

Commissioner Eggers, seconded by Commissioner Wallin, moved to waive the second reading and reappoint Kelly Coffey and Joe McNeil to the Voluntary Farmland Preservation Program Advisory Board.

### <u>Commissioner Appointments to the Watauga County Planning Board and Boone Rural Fire</u> Protection Service District Board

Each Commissioner nominates a representative to the Boone Rural Fire Protection Service District Board and the Watauga County Planning Board whose terms run concurrent with the term of the appointing Commissioner. Planning Board members must live within the appointing Commissioner's District and action must be taken by the entire Board of Commissioners to make these appointments. Boone Rural Fire Protection Service District Board members must own property and reside within the Fire Service District.

Chairman Turnbow, seconded by Commissioner Wallin, moved to reappoint Jody Eller to the Boone Rural Fire Protection Service District Board and Marsha Walpole to the Planning Board; both as representatives of District 4.

# Road, Bridge or Ferry Naming or Designation Request Process

Pursuant to NCGS §136-18(8), the North Carolina Board of Transportation may name roads, bridges, or ferries. The request process for approval of a road, bridge or ferry naming may be found in the sequential steps provided below.

Commonly used definitions throughout this document include the following:

- "Requesting party" refers to the individual/s who seeks to request a road, bridge or ferry to be named or designated.
- "Local government/s" shall mean the county, city, town or village in whose jurisdiction the facility lies.
- "Resolution" is defined as a written motion or formal request that the Board takes action on via a vote.
- "Department" shall mean the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT).

- The requesting party completes the <u>Road, Bridge or Ferry Naming Application Form</u> and submits it to the NCDOT staff contact in the Division. The Division will review and forward to the NC DOT Committee Staff lead.
- 2. The Chief Engineer's Office, Division Office and General Counsel review the submitted application.
  - If the application does not meet the policy requirements at this stage of the process, the Chief Engineer's Office or the Division Office will contact the requesting party to provide the reason(s) the application could not move forward.
  - If the application does meet the policy requirements, it will proceed in the process. The NCDOT staff contact will notify the requesting party.



# Road, Bridge or Ferry Naming or Designation Request Process

- 3. Once staff determines that the application appears to meet the minimum standards for continuing, the process will continue. The applicant should not consider this a cursory approval or any commitment from the department to honorarily designate a road or name a bridge. At this point the application has not completed the vetting process. If the submitted application continues in the request process, the next steps are as follows:
  - The requesting party is responsible for contacting and collaborating with the local government(s) to
    develop a formal resolution for consideration by the respective board/s (city council or county
    commission). The local resolutions are a part of the vetting process. The applicant should not
    convey or suggest Department approval has been granted at this time. Because the Board of
    Transportation has not reviewed or considered the application.
  - The local government(s) must draft a resolution consisting of 400 words or less.
  - The resolution must describe the honoree's accomplishments, credentials and specify the road, bridge or ferry to be named or designated.
  - If the road, bridge or ferry to be named or designated is in more than one municipality, resolutions from all municipalities are required.
  - The local government(s) from applicable municipalities must unanimously pass the resolution(s) in a
    public forum for the application to move forward in the request process.
- 4. If the local government(s) pass(es) the resolution unanimously, the application progresses in the request process and the next steps are as follows:
  - The requesting party submits the following documentation to the NCDOT staff contact in the Chief Engineer's Office.
    - A completed application
    - A copy of the resolution(s) passed unanimously by the respective local board/s.
    - A copy of the meeting minutes that state the resolution was passed unanimously and the opportunity for public input was provided.
    - A completed Character Certification Form
    - A minimum of three recommendation letters (civic, business, or service organizations) and verification of family support.
    - Written documentation that affirms the willingness of the local government or sponsor to participate financially by paying an administrative fee of \$2000 to offset costs associated with the program.
    - Verification of a valorous decoration during combat operations, if the naming or designation is for a military individual.



# Road, Bridge or Ferry Naming or Designation Request Process

- Once the supporting documentation outlined in section 4 is received by the NCDOT staff contact in the Chief Engineer's Office the naming or designation request is placed on an upcoming Board of Transportation Road, Bridge, and Ferry Naming Committee agenda for consideration.
  - Road, Bridge, and Ferry Naming Committee agendas are posted publicly on the <u>Board's website</u> each month.
  - The Board member representing the area where the requested road, bridge or ferry is located must endorse the naming or designation request to the Road, Bridge and Ferry Naming Committee.
- 6. If the Board's Road, Bridge and Ferry Naming Committee approves the requested naming or designation:
  - The Department will draft a resolution for vote by the Board.
    - The Board's resolution will describe the honoree's accomplishments, credentials and specify the road, bridge or ferry to be named or designated.
    - It will state the name that should appear on the sign.
    - The Department has final authority regarding sign design, including text.
- 7. The Board of Transportation votes on the naming or designation resolution.

If the Board of Transportation approves the requested naming or designation:

- The local government and the NCDOT Division Office are notified in writing of the approval and the required payment.
- Payment is due to the Department upon notification that the honorary designation was approved by the Board. Signs will not be manufactured until payment is received.
- The NCDOT Communications Office will plan a ceremony if one is desired by the local government.
- Signs are installed. Honorary signs will be ground mounted; overhead signs will not be installed.
- Signs will be installed at the beginning and ending termini of the approved roadway segment, and will not be installed on exits, Y-lines, or intersecting roadways.

If the Board of Transportation does not approve, NCDOT notifies the requesting party either by phone, email, or letter.

# PROPOSED KILL/CHILL MEAT SLAUGHTER FACILITY UPDATE MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Jim Hamilton, Cooperative Extension, will update the Board on the Kill/Chill project.

#### Updates on Proposed 'Kill-Chill' Meat Slaughter Facility at Landfill Site

- \$474,450 awarded from NC Ag Development Trust Fund in August, bringing total committed funds for the project to \$2.37m:
  - o Golden LEAF (\$1 million)
  - Tobacco Trust Fund (\$220k)
  - o ARC (\$100k)
  - Ag Development Trust Fund (\$474k)
  - o ARP/Watauga County (\$500k)
  - Opportunity Appalachia (\$75k)
- Soil testing at proposed site completed by Catawba Valley Engineering in early summer 2022 (\$4,000). \$13,407 spent to date on design/engineering out of \$77,800 allocated.
- Received notification of no award from USDA MPPEP proposal Nov 1 (which would have covered 20% of all construction costs). Another round of this grant funding to be announced shortly.
- Consultant sent proposed facility plans & budget in Oct & Dec for an 8,000 sq foot
  facility. We requested scaled down plan in the ~4,000 sq foot range to reduce footprint
  and budget. Waiting on updated facility & infrastructure plans from consultant for water
  and sewer before final planning/cost estimates/bid process. Should have those this
  month.
- Presented project overview to Town of Boone Town Council in Sept. Relayed the
  funding challenges of the project. Water and sewer access will have to be provided by
  Town. Town in support of the project and alluded to some financial and/or other
  support related to sewer/water infrastructure. Indicated that they would like to see
  plans and cost estimates before committing. Ordinance would have to be
  modified/amended related to annexation.
- High Country Council of Governments working on an EDA proposal to partially fund water/sewer infrastructure. Will be applying for an ARC construction grant in March 2023 to seek additional funding due to projected construction cost increases for the project.

AppalCART would like to request Watauga County consider approval of the FY 2023 Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) 2<sup>nd</sup> ROAP disbursement. The State has increased the amount allocated to Watauga County for FY 2023 to \$194,612. Watauga County was initially allocated a total of \$163,192 for FY 2023 which was a little less than the FY 2022 allocation of \$167,567. Changes were made to the previous FY2023 allocation estimates by NCDOT due to the FY2022 reconciliation process. The initial allocation was reduced to \$162,965, however, NCDOT will be providing a second allocation for \$31,647 later this month for a total of \$194,612. The revised funding is split into three (3) categories: Elderly and Disabled Transportation Assistance Program (EDTAP) \$75,348, Employment (EMPL) \$16,414, and Rural General Public (RGP) \$102,850. A match is no longer required for any of the ROAP funds.

These funds will help provide over 23,000 trips for elderly, disabled, and low income individuals.

Note: RGP services are not limited to specific groups. The RGP routes run twice per day Monday-Friday.

A committee comprised of representatives from Watauga County Finance, Watauga County POA, Watauga County DSS, Watauga Opportunities, Inc., and AppalCART provided input concerining the distribution of the funds to identify the greatest benefit to the county by making sure current service levels are maintained. A plan for distribution is not required as part of the application.

The first disbursement of funds was in October. Approval of the certification statement by the County Commissioners will ensure the County receives the additional funding allocated to Watauga County.

The AppalCART Board will consider endorsement of how to distribute the funds at their January 23, 2023 Board meeting.

AppalCART appreciates the Commissioners consideration of this Certification Statement for a 2<sup>nd</sup> ROAP disbursement from NCDOT.

# CERTIFIED STATEMENT SECOND ROAP DISBURSEMENT (JANUARY 2023) FY2023

## RURAL OPERATING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

County of Watauga

**WHEREAS**, the state-funded, formula-based Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) administered by the North Carolina Department of Transportation, Integrated Mobility Division provides funding for the operating cost of passenger trips for counties within the state;

**WHEREAS**, the county uses the most recent transportation plans (i.e., CCP, CTIP, LCP) available and other public involvement strategies to learn about the transportation needs of agencies and individuals in the county before determining the sub-allocation of these ROAP funds;

WHEREAS, the county government or regional public transportation authorities created pursuant to Article 25 or Article 26 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes (upon written agreement with the municipalities or counties served) are the only eligible recipients of Rural Operating Assistance Program funds which are allocated to the counties based on a formula as described in the Program Guidelines included in the ROAP State Management Plan. NCDOT will disburse the ROAP funds only to counties and eligible transportation authorities and not to any sub-recipients selected by the county;

**WHEREAS**, the county finance officer will be considered the county official accountable for the administration of the Rural Operating Assistance Program in the county, unless otherwise designated by the Board of County Commissioners;

**WHEREAS**, the passenger trips provided with ROAP funds must be accessible to individuals with disabilities and be provided without discrimination on the basis of national origin, creed, age, race, or gender (FTA C 4702.1B, FTA C 4704.1A, Americans with Disabilities Act 1990); and

**WHEREAS**, the period of performance for these funds will be July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023 regardless of the date on which ROAP funds are disbursed to the county.

# NOW, THEREFORE, by signing below, the duly authorized representatives of the County of <u>Watauga</u> North Carolina certify that the following statements are true and accurate:

- The county employed a documented methodology for sub-allocating ROAP funds that involved the participation of eligible agencies and citizens. Outreach efforts to include the participation of the elderly and individuals with disabilities, persons with limited English proficiency, minorities and low-income persons in the county's sub-allocation decision have been documented.
- The county will advise any sub-recipients about the source of the ROAP funds, specific program requirements and restrictions, eligible program expenses and reporting requirements. The county will be responsible for invoicing any sub-recipients for unexpended ROAP funds as needed.
- The county will monitor ROAP funded services routinely to verify that ROAP funds are being spent
  on allowable activities and that the eligibility of service recipients is being properly documented. The
  county will maintain records of trips for at least five years that prove that an eligible citizen was
  provided an eligible transportation service on the billed date, by whatever conveyance at the specified
  cost.
- The county will be responsible for monitoring the safety, quality, and cost of ROAP funded services
  and assures that any procurements by subrecipients for contracted services will follow state and
  federal guidelines.

- The county will conduct regular evaluations of ROAP funded passenger trips provided throughout the period of performance.
- The county will only use the ROAP funds to provide trips when other funding sources are not available for the same purpose or the other funding sources for the same purpose have been completely exhausted.
- The county assures that the required matching funds for the FY2023 ROAP can be generated from fares and/or provided from local funds.
- The county will notify the Regional Grant Specialist assigned to the county if any ROAP funded services are discontinued before the end of the period of performance due to the lack of funding. No additional ROAP funds will be available.
- The county will provide an accounting of trips and expenditures in monthly reports to NCDOT Integrated Mobility Division or its designee. Back-up documentation is required to support the monthly reports, failure to provide documentation will affect future disbursements. The June report will be considered the annual report.
- Any interest earned on the ROAP funds will be expended for eligible program uses as specified in the ROAP application. The County will include ROAP funds received and expended in its annual independent audit on the schedule of federal and state financial assistance. Funds passed through to other agencies will be identified as such.

Work Experience: I have worked as a planner with High Country Council of Governments for 24 years. Much of this job is related to economic development, as we assist local governments with projects that create or retain jobs. I have been involved with a wide variety of economic development projects ranging from conventional manufacturing (e.g. GE Aviation, Altec, Tyson) to arts & crafts to agriculture. I've had much interaction with EDCs and know most of the directors in our region well. I communicate regularly with state & federal agencies that fund economic development projects (e.g. Appalachian Regional Commission, US Dept of Commerce Economic Development Administration, NC Dept of Commerce) & have long-established relationships with their representatives. Much of my day-to-day work involves grant writing or administration, and our agency has also compiled economic development plans for several counties.

Volunteer Experience: I was one of the founding board members of Blue Ridge Conservancy, serving on the board for 20 years, including several years as president & vice-president. I recently rotated off, but I'm still active on a committee, which I chaired for a number of years. Early on, our priorities included the preservation of "working" landscapes; i.e. not locking land up in a preserve, but protecting it while still allowing economic activity, such as farming or timbering. Such a philosophy is shared by the Blue Ridge Resource Conservation & Development Council, an entirely separate organization where I've served on the Council for about 15 years. As the name implies, the organization strives to implement conservation-based economic development.

I worked in retail businesses for 11 years while in school and a few years afterwards.

Other Experience: In addition, I think I could bring an agricultural perspective to the EDC that might not be presently represented based on my experience as a farmer, as chair of the Farmland Preservation Advisory Board, and my work on agricultural economic development projects in other counties. I assisted Wilkes County with a cattle genetic improvement project and developed a farmland preservation plan for Ashe County. I'm currently helping Ashe County secure funding for a livestock sales facility. Other agricultural economic development projects where I've been involved include a farmers market and two food hubs.

Other Comments: I think it's important for economic development to be sustainable; an overused word but one that is still descriptive of an economy that preserves the environment and enhances our quality of life. It's especially critical in Watauga County, where the environment and quality of life underlie much economic activity. Traditional economic development approaches still work to some degree, but I would be open to innovative projects and unconventional ideas.
