The Watauga County Board of Commissioners held a regular meeting, as scheduled, on Tuesday, January 17, 2017, at 5:30 P.M. in the Commissioners' Board Room of the Watauga County Administration Building, Boone, North Carolina.

Chairman Welch called the meeting to order at 5:30 P.M.

Commissioner Turnbow opened with prayer and Commissioner Yates led the Pledge of Allegiance.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE FY 2017 VEHICLE PURCHASE REQUEST

County Manager Geouque stated that the Board had previously approved an additional \$105,000 to purchase three (3) new Ford All-Wheel Drive Police Interceptor SUVs. Asheville Ford's price is \$27,345.28 for each of the All-Wheel Drive Police Interceptor SUVs. Up-fitting by DANA Safety Supply, Inc. for each vehicle is \$5,422.12. The total cost for the three vehicles including \$2,479.08 for taxes and tags and \$16,266.36 for up-fitting is \$100,781.28. Adequate funds have been budgeted to cover the cost of the vehicles and up-fitting.

Vice-Chairman Kennedy, seconded by Commissioner Hodges, moved to accept Asheville Ford's bid in the amount of \$84,514.92 for three (3) new Ford All-Wheel Drive Police Interceptor SUVs and DANA Safety Supply, Inc.'s bid for up-fitting in the amount of \$16,266.36.

A. Resolution Requesting the North Carolina General Assembly Ban Sunday Hunting in Watauga County

County Manager Geouque presented, per Commissioner request, a draft resolution requesting the North Carolina General Assembly ban hunting on Sundays in Watauga County. The County was previously unsuccessful in requesting that the ban on Sunday hunting not be lifted or otherwise exempt Watauga County from allowing hunting on Sundays.

Commissioner Yates, seconded by Commissioner Turnbow, moved to schedule a public hearing on Tuesday, February 21, 2017, at 5:30 P.M. to allow for citizens comments regarding the proposed resolution.

B. Proposed Contract for Classification & Compensation Study

County Manager Geouque stated that, per Board direction, staff solicited a price for a comprehensive classification and compensation study. The last comprehensive study by Springsted, Inc. was conducted in 2001 with an update performed in 2006.

The County has received excellent service from Springsted, Inc. and they are recommended by the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners. At budget time requests were made for pay increases for a couple of employees. Conducting the comprehensive classification and compensation study will ensure the County is competitive in the job market and all employees are considered fairly and equitably with regards to compensation. Further, due to the recession many County employees have taken on added job responsibilities and the study will confirm the employees are being paid accordingly. Adequate funds have been budgeted to cover the proposed amounts of \$35,870 plus travel, copying and incidentals not to exceed \$3,000.

Commissioner Yates, seconded by Vice-Chairman Kennedy, moved to approve the Springsted, Inc., contract and proposal in the amount of \$35,870 plus travel, copying and incidentals not to exceed \$3,000 contingent upon County Attorney review.

 - Typically have not seen a medical provider in several years or more.
 - Faced with making choices between food or medicine

The Maintenance Department received bids for three security systems projects on January 5, 2017. The scope of the bids included:

- East Annex Install access control hardware to prevent unauthorized entry into the first floor and to add an interoffice paging system similar to the system currently utilized by the District Attorney's Office. Install interior and exterior cameras as well as monitors.
- Anderson Building Install access control hardware to prevent unauthorized entry into premises. Install alarm system. Install interior and exterior cameras.
- Human Services Center Install access control hardware to prevent unauthorized entry into building and the DSS suite of offices. Install interoffice panic alarm system and paging with connection to central station monitoring service.

County staff met with representatives from each building to confirm the scope of the work and address the security issues that have been brought to the county's attention in 2016.

B. Hazardous Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) Morningside Drive Project

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

In August of 2014, the Board approved the submittal of an application to the Hazardous Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) for funding for the demolition and removal of a home located at 131 Morningside Drive in Boone. Several years ago numerous homes located in the area were demolished and removed along Morningside Drive as part of a HMGP project. At that time, the subject property owner was not interested in participating in the project. However, continued flood related issues after the sale of the home has prompted the new owners to request participation in the HMGP. Based on conversations with Mr. Stephen Sudderth, the Town of Boone was not interested in participation leaving the County the only option for assistance and relief for the home owner.

The total cost of the project is \$215,874 with a required match of \$53,968.50, which is to be paid by the State. The only cost to the County would be staff time and maintenance (mowing/weed eating) of the property once the project is completed. Staff would continue to work with the Town for possible incorporation into the existing lots already mitigated.

Board approval was given to accept the grant from the Hazardous Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) in the amount of \$215,874 with the required match of \$53,968.50 to be paid by the State.

The initial value of the property was \$189,400 and the new appraised value is \$220,000. Due to the new appraisal of the property, an additional \$30,600 is required to complete the project. No County funds are required.

Board action is required to request an additional \$30,600 bringing the total project cost to \$246,474.

B. Update on Sunday Hunting

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

A draft resolution has been prepared for consideration by the Board of Commissioners. The North Carolina General Assembly amended the statutes to enact the current Sunday hunting regulations. The North Carolina Association of County Commissioners has recently provided some additional information regarding Sunday hunting. A copy of Session Law 2015-144 House Bill 640 is included. Part V, Section 5 (b) (highlighted) is of significance to the County regarding hunting on Sundays.

SECTION 5.(b) states:

(b) A county may by ordinance prohibit hunting on Sunday as allowed under G.S. 103-2, provided the ordinance complies with all of the following:

- (1) The ordinance shall be applicable from January 1 until December 31 of any year of effectiveness.
- (2) The ordinance shall allow for individuals hunting in an adjacent county with no restriction on Sunday hunting to retrieve any animal lawfully shot from the adjacent county.
- (3) The ordinance shall be applicable to the entire county.

Section 5 continues with:

SECTION 5.(c) Subsection (b) of this section becomes effective October 1, 2017. A county may adopt an ordinance to prohibit Sunday hunting prior to October 1, 2017, but any such ordinance shall not become effective until October 1, 2017. The remainder of this section becomes effective October 1, 2015.

A resolution would only be required if the Board wished to pass an ordinance banning Sunday hunting with an effective date prior to October 1, 2017. In light of this information the Board has three (3) options to consider.

Option 1. Continue with the public hearing scheduled for February 21, 2017 to seek additional citizen input regarding Sunday hunting. Upon closing of the public hearing, the Board determines an ordinance banning Sunday hunting is warranted, and directs staff to develop an ordinance for Board review and schedules an additional public hearing on the proposed ordinance. After the public hearing the Board adopts the ordinance with an effective date of January 1, 2018.

Option 2. Continue with the public hearing scheduled for February 21, 2017 to seek additional citizen input regarding Sunday hunting. Upon closing of the public hearing, the Board determines an ordinance banning Sunday hunting is **not** warranted; NCGS 103-2 would address Sunday hunting.

Option 3. The Board reviews and considers citizen input already received and determines an ordinance banning Sunday hunting is <u>not</u> warranted; and NCGS 103-2 NCGS 103-2 would address Sunday hunting. The public hearing scheduled for February 21, 2017 would be cancelled.

Staff seeks direction from the Board.

RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE NORTH CAROLINA GENERAL ASSEMBLY BAN SUNDAY HUNTING IN WATAUGA COUNTY

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute 103-2 currently allows any landowner or member of the landowner's family, or any person with written permission from the landowner, may hunt with the use of firearms on Sunday on the landowner's property, except that all of the following limitations apply:

- (1) Hunting on Sunday between 9:30 A.M. and 12:30 P.M. is prohibited, except on controlled hunting preserves licensed pursuant to N.C.G.S. 113-273(g).
- (2) Hunting of migratory birds on Sunday is prohibited.
- (3) The use of a firearm to take deer that are run or chased by dogs on Sunday is prohibited.
- (4) Hunting on Sunday within 500 yards of a place of worship or any accessory structure thereof, or within 500 yards of a residence not owned by the landowner, is prohibited.
- (5) Hunting on Sunday in a county having a population greater than 700,000 people is prohibited; and

WHEREAS, Archery season is allowable seven days a week within the permit guidelines established by state game laws; and

WHEREAS, It is unlawful to hunt on Sundays on public lands, except that military installations under the exclusive jurisdiction of the federal government may allow hunting on Sundays; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina was one of only 11 states that banned hunting on Sundays in which the ban was in place for over 144 years; and

WHEREAS, a 2006 study requested by Governor Mike Easley, and conducted by the public opinion research firm Responsive Management, showed that the majority of North Carolina residents were opposed to Sunday hunting; and

WHEREAS, the study, "An Assessment of Public and Hunter Opinions and the Costs and Benefits to North Carolina of Hunting on Sunday," found 81 percent of the general population favored hunting, but 65 percent were opposed to hunting on Sundays. Among hunters, 38 percent supported Sunday hunting, while 53 percent were opposed; and

WHEREAS, Watauga County is predominately rural and Sunday hunting has the potential to threaten the serenity and safety of churches and its members throughout the County; and

WHEREAS, the Watauga County Commissioners received a petition in 2013 with over 700 signatures opposing the lifting of the ban on Sunday hunting.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Watauga County Board of Commissioners request the North Carolina General Assembly allow Watauga County to ban hunting on Sunday.

MANNER OF TAKING

Definition of Take To take is defined as all operations during, immediately preparatory and immediately subsequent to an attempt, whether successful or not, to capture, kill, pursue, hunt or otherwise harm or reduce to possession any fisheries resource or wildlife resource.

Season Dates For most species, hunting seasons are set to open on the same day of the week every year and at the same general time. For example, rabbit season opens every year on the Saturday before Thanksgiving and ends on the last day of February. Changes in season dates that are a result of newly adopted regulations will appear in red ink. However, most seasonal dates that are different from last year are the result of the annual shift of days in each year's calendar.

General Restrictions

- Lawful seasons and bag limits for each species apply beginning with the first day of the listed season and continuing through the last day of the listed season, including Sundays for private lands, with Sunday hunting restrictions listed in the next paragraph.
- It unlawful to hunt on Sundays on public lands, except that military installations under the exclusive jurisdiction of the federal government may allow hunting on Sundays.

On Sundays, on private lands, the following apply:

- Hunting with firearms between 9:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. is prohibited except on controlled hunting preserves;
- Hunting migratory birds is prohibited;
- The use of firearms to take deer that are run or chased by dogs is prohibited;
- Hunting with a firearm within 500 yards of a place of worship or any accessory structure thereof, or within 500 yards of a residence not owned by the landowner, is prohibited; and
- Hunting in Wake and Mecklenburg counties with a firearm is prohibited.
- Archery equipment may be used to hunt on private lands on Sunday without the restrictions applied to hunting with firearms.
- Shooting hours. Game birds and animals may be taken only between 30 minutes before sunrise and 30 minutes after sunset with rifle, pistol, shotgun, bow and arrow, dogs or by means of falconry with the following exceptions: raccoons, feral swine and opossums may be taken at night. Coyotes may be taken at night in all counties except Beaufort, Dare, Hyde, Tyrrell and Washington. Call 800-675-0263 for shooting hours for migratory birds.

Retrieval

If a hunter kills or wounds a big game animal during legal shooting hours the hunter may use a portable light source and a single dog on a leash to assist the hunter in retrieving the dead or wounded big game animal and may dispatch a wounded big game animal using a .22-caliber rimfire pistol, archery equipment, or a handgun otherwise legal for that hunting season. If necessary, the hunter may also retrieve wounded big game in this manner from 30 minutes after sunset to 11:00 p.m. The hunter may not use a motorized vehicle when searching for the wounded animal.

Taking

- It is unlawful to use any of the following in taking wild birds or animals:
 - artificial lights (including laser sights), except for big game retrieval and taking feral swine and coyotes at night
 - electronic or recorded calls (except electronic calls are permitted for crow, coyote and feral swine hunting). Other exceptions for migratory game birds may be found under individual season descriptions.
 - fire

- motor vehicles—at no time may any wild Panina BGF Meatinge taken with the aid of a motor vehicle while the passenger area is occupied or while the vehicle engine is running
- vessels: under sail, under power, or with the engine running, or while still in the motion from such propulsion, except crippled waterfowl (see page 63); or - airplanes
- It is unlawful to take wild birds with the use or aid of bait, which includes any salt, salt lick, grain, fruit, honey, sugar-based material or substance, animal parts or animal products. Regulations for taking bear with unprocessed foods are on page 47.
- No wild turkey may be taken from an area in which bait has been placed until the expiration of 10 days after the bait has been consumed or otherwise removed.
- It is unlawful to take deer that are swimming or in water above the knees of the deer.
- Migratory game birds may be taken only during the hours and in the manner permitted by federal regulations.
- It is unlawful to shoot at or into a squirrel's nest.
- Individuals engaged in box trapping rabbits must have an appropriate hunting license to take or transport live rabbits.
- It is unlawful to accept the gift of wildlife lawfully taken unless you possess in writing the donor's name, address and hunting license number.
- It is unlawful to dump animal remains anywhere without permission.

Archery

 Archery hunting is limited to longbows and recurved bows having a minimum pull of 40 pounds, compound bows with a minimum pull of 35 pounds and crossbows with a minimum draw weight of 100 pounds. Only arrows with a fixed minimum broadhead width of ⁷/₈ inch or a mechanically opening broadhead with a minimum width of 7/8 inch in the open position may be used for taking bear, deer or wild turkey. Blunt-type arrowheads may be used in taking small animals and birds, including but not limited to, rabbits, squirrels, quail, grouse, pheasants. Poisonous, drugged, barbed or explosive arrowheads may not be used for taking any game. Bolts must use broadheads as described for arrows

Shotguns

- Shotguns must be no larger than 10-gauge.
- When hunting migratory game birds, shotguns must be plugged so as to limit their maximum capacity to three shells.

Pistols

- During the open hunting season for rabbits, squirrels, opossums, raccoons, furbearing animals and legal nongame animals and birds, these species may be taken with a pistol. There are no restrictions on caliber and barrel length.
- A hunter or trapper lawfully taking wildlife by another method may use a pistol to dispatch the animal or bird taken, except as noted below.
- Deer and bear may be taken with a handgun during the established gun hunting season. There are no restrictions on barrel length or caliber.

It is unlawful to hunt or take wild turkeys with pistols. Rifles

- Fully automatic rifles are unlawful. All other rifles are legal except: - Rifles are prohibited by federal law in hunting migratory game birds.
 - Local laws prohibit or restrict rifles in some counties. See the local laws section on page 76.
 - It is unlawful to hunt or take wild turkeys with rifles.

Blackpowder

• During the blackpowder deer season, the only lawful firearms are blackpowder shotguns, rifles and handguns. The Commission defines a blackpowder firearm as any firearm that cannot use fixed ammunition.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA SESSION 2015

SESSION LAW 2015-144 HOUSE BILL 640

AN ACT TO PRESERVE NORTH CAROLINA'S OUTDOOR HERITAGE FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS AND AMEND VARIOUS WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION LAWS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

PART I. DEVELOPMENT OF NORTH CAROLINA OUTDOOR HERITAGE TRUST FUND

SECTION 1. The Wildlife Resources Commission, in conjunction with the Outdoor Heritage Advisory Council established by Section 2 of this act, shall develop a plan for establishing and implementing the North Carolina Outdoor Heritage Trust Fund for Youth Outdoor Heritage Promotion. The plan shall provide for the Trust Fund:

- (1) To provide for the expansion of opportunities for persons age 16 and under to engage in outdoor recreational activities, including, but not limited to, hiking, horseback riding, boating, sport shooting and archery, bird watching and wildlife watching, camping, swimming, hunting, trapping, and fishing in order to pass on North Carolina's outdoor heritage to future generations.
- (2) To be eligible for the receipt of funds through check-off donations of not more than two dollars (\$2.00) by persons paying for transactions processed through the Commission, including, but not limited to, hunting and fishing licenses or paying outdoor access fees issued by other organizations and also through donations from private organizations or citizens.
- (3) To be administered by the Outdoor Heritage Advisory Council established by Section 2 of this act.

The Wildlife Resources Commission and the Outdoor Heritage Advisory Council shall provide a final report on the development of the plan for establishing and implementing the Trust Fund to the 2015 General Assembly when it reconvenes in 2016.

PART II. ESTABLISHMENT OF OUTDOOR HERITAGE ADVISORY COUNCIL

SECTION 2.(a) Article 7 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new Part to read:

"Part 36. Outdoor Heritage Advisory Council.

"§ 143B-344.60. Outdoor Heritage Advisory Council.

(a) The Outdoor Heritage Advisory Council is established within the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission for organizational and budgetary purposes only. The Council shall exercise all of its statutory powers independent of control by the Executive Director of the Wildlife Resources Commission. The Council shall advise State agencies and the General Assembly on the promotion of outdoor recreational activities, including, but not limited to, hiking, horseback riding, boating, sport shooting and archery, bird watching and wildlife watching, camping, swimming, hunting, trapping, and fishing in order to preserve North Carolina's outdoor heritage for future generations.

(b) The Council shall consist of 11 members, appointed as follows:

- (1) <u>Three members appointed by the General Assembly, upon the</u> recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
- (2) <u>Three members appointed by the General Assembly, upon the</u> recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (3) Three members appointed by the Governor.
- (4) One member appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture.



(5) <u>One member appointed by the chair of the Wildlife Resources Commission.</u> <u>All members of the Council shall have knowledge and experience in outdoor recreational</u> <u>activities and have a demonstrated interest in promoting outdoor heritage.</u>

(c) The terms of the initial members of the Council shall commence October 1, 2015. Of the Governor's initial appointments, one member shall be designated to serve a term of three years, one member shall be designated to serve a term of two years, and one member shall be designated to serve a term of one year. Of the initial appointments by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, one member shall be designated to serve a term of three years, one member shall be designated to serve a term of two years, and one member shall be designated to serve a term of one year. Of the initial appointments by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one member shall be designated to serve a term of three years, one member shall be designated to serve a term of two years, and one member shall be designated to serve a term of one year. Of the initial appointments by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one member shall be designated to serve a term of three years, one member shall be designated to serve a term of two years, and one member shall be designated to serve a term of one year. The members appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture and the chair of the Wildlife Resources Commission shall each serve an initial term of four years. After the initial appointees' terms have expired, all members shall be appointed for a term of four years. No member shall serve more than two successive terms.

Any appointment to fill a vacancy on the Council created by the resignation, dismissal, death, or disability of a member shall be for the balance of the unexpired term.

(d) The initial chair of the Council shall be designated by the Governor from the Council members. The initial chair shall hold this office for not more than one year. Subsequent chairs shall be elected by the Council for terms of two years.

(e) <u>The Council shall meet quarterly and at other times at the call of the chair. A</u> majority of members of the Council shall constitute a quorum.

(f) <u>Council members shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of their duties in accordance with G.S. 138-5 and G.S. 138-6, as applicable.</u>

(g) <u>The Executive Director of the Wildlife Resources Commission shall provide clerical</u> and other assistance as needed."

SECTION 2.(b) This section becomes effective July 1, 2015.

PART III. EXPANDED ACCESS TO PUBLIC LANDS

SECTION 3.(a) The Legislative Research Commission shall study the need for expanded access to public lands. The Commission shall examine the ways in which public land management plans affect opportunities to engage in outdoor recreational activities, including, but not limited to, hiking, horseback riding, boating, sport shooting and archery, bird watching and wildlife watching, camping, swimming, hunting, trapping, and fishing and make recommendations for increasing the public's opportunities to access public lands for those purposes.

SECTION 3.(b) The Legislative Research Commission may make an interim report to the 2015 General Assembly when it reconvenes in 2016 and shall make its final report to the 2017 General Assembly when it convenes.

PART IV. "THREE STRIKES" RULE FOR HUNTING ON POSTED PROPERTY AND REVIEW SUSPENSION OF HUNTING PRIVILEGES FOR NEGLIGENT HUNTERS

SECTION 4.(a) G.S. 113-276.3(d) is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"§ 113-276.3. Mandatory suspension of entitlement to license or permit for fixed period upon conviction of specified offenses.

(d) Any violation of this Subchapter or of any rule adopted by the Wildlife Resources Commission under the authority of this Subchapter which is subject to a penalty greater than the one provided in G.S. 113-135(a)(1) is a suspension offense. Conviction of any of the following suspension offenses results in a suspension for a period of two years:

- (1) A violation of G.S. 113-294(b).
- (2) A violation of G.S. 113-294(c).
- (2a) A violation of G.S. 113-294(c1).
- (3) A violation of G.S. 113-294(e).
- (4) Repealed by Session Laws 1999-120, s. 2, effective October 1, 1999.
- (5) A violation of G.S. 113-291.1A.
- (6) <u>A third or subsequent violation of G.S. 14-159.6(a).</u>

Session Law 2015-144

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A conviction of any other suspension offense results in a suspension for a period of one year."

SECTION 4.(b) The Wildlife Resources Commission shall review the provisions of Article 21B of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes that provide for the suspension of hunting privileges upon conviction of criminally negligent hunting and determine whether those provisions should be amended or expanded to provide increased protection to the public from negligent or reckless hunting. In developing its findings, the Wildlife Resources Commission shall consult with organized hunting clubs and propose recommendations to address individuals who repeatedly violate club rules and regulations. The Wildlife Resources Commission shall also consult with public interest groups in developing its findings. The Wildlife Resources Commission shall report its findings and recommendations to the 2015 General Assembly when it reconvenes in 2016.

PART V. ALLOW SEVEN-DAY HUNTING ON PRIVATE LAND WITH PERMISSION OF THE OWNER

SECTION 5.(a) G.S. 103-2 reads as rewritten:

"§ 103-2. Hunting Method of take when hunting on Sunday.

(a) If any person shall, except in defense of his own property, hunt on Sunday, having with him a shotgun, rifle, or pistol, he Any landowner or member of the landowner's family, or any person with written permission from the landowner, may hunt with the use of firearms on Sunday on the landowner's property, except that all of the following limitations apply:

- (1) Hunting on Sunday between 9:30 A.M. and 12:30 P.M. is prohibited, except on controlled hunting preserves licensed pursuant to G.S. 113-273(g).
- (2) Hunting of migratory birds on Sunday is prohibited.
- (3) The use of a firearm to take deer that are run or chased by dogs on Sunday is prohibited.
- (4) Hunting on Sunday within 500 yards of a place of worship or any accessory structure thereof, or within 500 yards of a residence not owned by the landowner, is prohibited.
- (5) <u>Hunting on Sunday in a county having a population greater than 700,000</u> people is prohibited.

(b) <u>A person who hunts on Sunday in a manner prohibited under subsection (a) of this</u> <u>section</u> shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor. Provided, that the provisions hereof shall not <u>be of this section are not</u> applicable to military reservations, the jurisdiction of which is exclusively in the federal government, or to field trials authorized by the Wildlife Resources <u>Commission</u>. <u>Commission</u>, or to actions taken in defense of a person's property. Wildlife protectors are granted authority to enforce the provisions of this section."

SECTION 5.(b) G.S. 153A-129 reads as rewritten:

"§ 153A-129. Firearms.

(a) <u>A-Except as provided in this section, a county may by ordinance regulate, restrict, or</u> prohibit the discharge of firearms at any time or place except <u>in any of the following instances:</u>

- (1) when When used to take birds or animals pursuant to Chapter 113, Subchapter IV, IV.
- (2) when <u>When</u> used in defense of person or property, <u>property</u>.
- (3) or when When used pursuant to lawful directions of law-enforcement officers.

(b) <u>A county may by ordinance prohibit hunting on Sunday as allowed under</u> <u>G.S. 103-2, provided the ordinance complies with all of the following:</u>

- (1) <u>The ordinance shall be applicable from January 1 until December 31 of any</u> year of effectiveness.
- (2) The ordinance shall allow for individuals hunting in an adjacent county with no restriction on Sunday hunting to retrieve any animal lawfully shot from the adjacent county.
- (3) The ordinance shall be applicable to the entire county.

(c) A county may also regulate the display of firearms on the public roads, sidewalks, alleys, or other public property.

(d) This section does not limit a county's authority to take action under Article 1A of Chapter 166A of the General Statutes."

SECTION 5.(c) Subsection (b) of this section becomes effective October 1, 2017. A county may adopt an ordinance to prohibit Sunday hunting prior to October 1, 2017, but any

such ordinance shall not become effective until October 1, 2017. The remainder of this section becomes effective October 1, 2015.

PART VI. MINIMUM WEIGHT OF ADULT BEARS

SECTION 6. Any rule adopted by the Wildlife Resources Commission that regulates the taking of female bears with cubs or that regulates the taking or possession of cub bears shall define cub bears as bears weighing less than 75 pounds.

PART VII. EXTEND BREEDING SEASON FOR FOXES AT BLADEN LAKES STATE FOREST GAME LAND

SECTION 7.(a) G.S. 113-291.4 is amended by adding a new subsection to read: "§ 113-291.4. Regulation of foxes; study of fox and fur-bearer populations.

(j) <u>The Wildlife Resources Commission shall prohibit the use of dogs in hunting foxes</u> during the period from March 15 through July 15 in Bladen Lakes State Forest Game Land." **SECTION 7.(b)** This section becomes effective June 1, 2015.

PART VIII. EXEMPTION FROM CIVIL LIABILITY FOR LANDOWNERS GIVING PERMISSION TO RETRIEVE HUNTING DOGS

SECTION 8. Article 22 of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"<u>§ 113-291.5A. Exemption from civil liability for landholder permitting retrieval of hunting dogs.</u>

(a) It is the intent of the General Assembly to recognize that hunting with dogs is a valuable part of the outdoor heritage of the State of North Carolina, and it is further the intent of the General Assembly to encourage cooperative and neighborly agreements between landowners and hunters to allow legal retrieval of hunting dogs.

(b) Any person, as an owner, lessee, occupant, or otherwise in control of land, who gives permission to a hunter to enter upon the land for the purpose of retrieving hunting dogs that have strayed onto the land owes that hunter the same duty of care the person owes a trespasser."

PART IX. EFFECTIVE DATE AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

SECTION 9.(a) If any provision of this act or its application is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of this act that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this act are severable.

SECTION 9.(b) Except as otherwise provided, this act becomes effective October 1, 2015.

C. Broadband Survey

MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Once these areas are identified a map will be created to provide to possible vendors for services. The County has partnered with Appalachian State University, County Library, and the North Carolina Information Technology Broadband Infrastructure Office.

Included in your packet is a copy of the public service announcement along with the link to the survey. Staff, with Board approval, will advertise the study on the County website, local newspapers, and University and School Board venues. Upon completion and analysis of the survey the results will be presented to the Board and further action will be determined at that time.

Staff seeks Board approval to proceed forward with the study.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Watauga County is conducting a Broadband Survey in an effort to improve internet services throughout the community. Internet service is now considered an essential service in most communities. Modern education requires a fast, robust and reliable broadband for on-site students and teachers at schools or university campuses as well as remote.
